

History & Facts

History of Head Start

In 1964, the Federal Government created a panel of child development experts to design a program to help communities overcome the barriers of young children living in poverty. The findings of that panel report became the blueprint for Project Head Start.

Project Head Start, launched as an eight-week summer program by the Office of Economic Opportunity in 1965, was designed to help break the cycle of poverty by providing preschool children of low-income families with a comprehensive program to meet their emotional, social, health, nutritional, and psychological needs. Recruiting children age three to school entry age, Head Start was enthusiastically received by education, child development specialists, community leaders and parents across the nation.

In 1969, Head Start was transferred from the Office of Economic Opportunity to the Office of Child Development in the US Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and has now become a program within the Administration on Children, Youth and Families in the Department of Health and Human Services. A well established, though still an innovative program, Head Start has had a strong impact on communities and early childhood programs across the country.

Head Start programs are operated by over 1500 community-based organizations, including school districts, universities, community health centers, tribal governments, Alaska Native Corporation, city and county governments, Community Action Agencies, and other profit and nonprofit organizations.



What is School Readiness?

The Office of Head Start (OHS) defines school readiness as children being ready for school, families ready to support their children's learning, and schools ready for the children who enter their doors. Children's school readiness is measured by the skills set out in the five domains of the **Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework**:

- Language and Literacy
- Cognition and General Knowledge
- Approaches to Learning
- Physical Development and Health
- Social and Emotional Development

Families are engaged in their children's learning and development and poised to support the lifelong success of their child. Head Start recognizes that parents are their children's primary teachers and advocates. As Head Start programs, parents, and schools work together to promote school readiness and engage families as their children make the transition to kindergarten, schools become ready for children.





SCHOOL READINESS GOALS

Social & Emotional Development	The children will be able to show an increasing ability to manage their own emotions and behaviors.				
Physical Well Being and Motor Development	The children will be able to show use of fingers and hands in small movements, as well as using tools for writing and drawing.				
Cognition and General Knowledge	 The children will be able to recognize and recall past experiences to make connections when learning. The children will be able to show beginning math skills including shape recognition, counting, and connecting numbers to quantities. 				
Language and Literacy	 The children will be able to use appropriate communication skills to express themselves. The children will be able to show alphabet knowledge through upper and lower case letter recognition. 				
Approaches to Learning	The children will be able to show a positive approach to learning through engagement, attentiveness, persistence, and curiosity.

The Head Start program depends on many people working together, sharing their talents, knowledge and energy, so that the children can receive the greatest benefits. The more that the child's family invests in the program, the better our program will be.

As your child's first and most influential teacher, parents have an important role in Head Start. Parents are always welcome in the classroom by helping with or leading activities or projects, field trips, planning classroom activities with the teaching staff, and introducing or sharing their culture with the class.

How do parents and staff work together?

- Family Service Workers meet with the families in their homes and assist them in setting school readiness goals and expressed family need goals. They follow up with families by providing information and referrals as needed to help families accomplish the goals they set.
- **Teachers** meet with the child's family four times each year for two conferences and two home visits. Parents are provided with a copy of the child's progress at least twice a year. Parents/Guardians are encouraged to volunteer time in the classrooms as often as possible. We have an "*Open Door*" policy for parents/guardians to come to the classroom at any time.



How do parents share their ideas, gifts, and talents with the Head Start program?

- PCC Parent Committee Meetings are held monthly. At these meetings, family and staff discuss center and community concerns and suggestions. Presenters discuss topics of interest chosen by the participants and a craft or activity is scheduled.
- **Policy Council** is the advisory board of the Head Start program. Parents, guardians and community volunteers meet monthly to plan for the future of Head Start. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month at the Northern Tier Community Action Corporation's Conference room.







There are a number of ways that parents can help teaching staff by sharing opinions, ideas and thoughts, working on projects at home, communicating with the staff, helping other parents feel welcome, and reinforcing learning at home.

TRANSITION to Kindergarten

What is it and why is it important?

What do we mean by the term "kindergarten transition"? The word transition refers to the process of change. Transitioning to kindergarten is one of the most significant changes a child will experience in their life. This is a time that can be very stressful for a young child. They are leaving either the home environment or the familiar environment of their preschool classroom to enter a new place.

Transition is a period of adjustment. All adjustments are stressful. When parents, teacher, and administrators work together, the process of transitioning to kindergarten is smoother and your child will experience less stress. Research has shown that a child's adjustment to school has a significant impact on his later academic achievement.


What opportunities will my child and family have that will allow a smooth transition into kindergarten? Families in Head Start will have the opportunity to participate in transition activities throughout the year. They can be an advocate for their child by participating on the Transition Advisory Board, along with Head Start staff and school district personnel. They can also attend a transition meeting with the school district to ask questions and share information about their child. Children will also be invited to participate in a kindergarten visit where they will get to meet kindergarten teachers and other adults in the building that they will see often!

How will my child benefit from effective transitions? Your child experiences: Increased self-confidence, improved relations with other children and adults, increased motivation and openness to new experiences.






