History & Facts

In 1964, the Federal Government created a panel of child development experts to design a program to help communities overcome the barriers of young children living in poverty. The findings of that panel report became the blueprint for Project Head Start.

Project Head Start was launched as an eight-week summer program by the Office of Economic Opportunity in 1965, designed to help break the cycle of poverty by providing preschool children of low-income families with a comprehensive program to meet their emotional, social, health, nutritional, and psychological needs. Recruiting children age three to school entry age, Head Start was enthusiastically received by education, child development specialists, community leaders and parents across the nation.

In 1969, Head Start was transferred from the Office of Economic Opportunity to the Office of Child Development in the US Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and has now become a program within the Administration on Children, Youth and Families in the Department of Health and Human Services. A well established, though still an innovative program, Head Start has had a strong impact on communities and early childhood programs across the country.

Head Start programs are operated by over 1500 community-based organizations, including school districts, universities, community health centers, tribal governments, Alaska Native Corporation, city and county governments, Community Action Agencies, and other profit and nonprofit organizations.





What is School Readiness?

The Office of Head Start (OHS) defines school readiness as children being ready for school, families ready to support their children's learning, and schools ready for the children who enter their doors. Children's school readiness is measured by the skills set out in the five domains of the **Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework**:

- Language and Literacy
- Cognition and General Knowledge
- Approaches to Learning
- Physical Development and Health
- Social and Emotional Development

Families are engaged in their children's learning and development and poised to support the lifelong success of their child. Head Start recognizes that parents are their children's primary teachers and advocates. As Head Start programs, parents, and schools work together to promote school readiness and engage families as their children make the transition to kindergarten, schools become ready for children.



TRANSITION to Kindergarten

What do we mean when we say "transition to kindergarten?" The word transition refers to the process of change. Transitioning to kindergarten is one of the most significant changes a child will experience in their life. This is a time that can be very stressful for a young child. They are leaving either the home environment or the familiar environment of their preschool classroom to enter a new place.

What opportunities will my child and family have that will help make the transition to kindergarten smoother? Families in Head Start will have the opportunity to participate in transition activities throughout the year. They can be an advocate for their child by participating on the Transition Advisory Board alongside Head Start staff and school district personnel. They can also attend a transition meeting with the school district to ask questions and share information about their child. Children will also be invited to participate in a kindergarten visit where they will get to meet kindergarten teachers and other adults in the building that they will see often!

How will my child benefit from effective transitions? Your child will gain increased self-confidence, improved relations with other children and adults, increased motivation, and an openness to new experiences.






Head Start is a holistic program that also includes health education. With educational opportunities provided to both parents and children on the importance of physical and dental health, we strive to improve the overall health of all our students. Per Head Start regulations, every child enrolled in Head Start is required to obtain a physical and dental exam within 90 days of enrollment. If a child does not have a medical or dental home, our staff help connect them to resources. We are also pleased to provide a mobile dentist in our centers thanks to partnerships with area dentists. At Head Start we work to remove any barriers to a healthier lifestyle.

Over 80% of our students have current dental exams while 83% have current physical exams.





As your child's first and most influential teacher, parents have an important role in Head Start. Parents are always welcome in the classroom by helping with or leading activities or projects, field trips, planning classroom activities with the teaching staff, and introducing or sharing their culture with the class.

How do parents and staff work together?

Family Service Workers meet with the families in their homes and assist them in setting school readiness goals and expressed family need goals. They follow up with families by providing information and referrals as needed to help families accomplish the goals they set.

Teachers meet with the child's family four times each year for two conferences and two home visits. Parents are provided with a copy of the child's progress at least twice a year. Parents/ Guardians are encouraged to volunteer time in the classrooms as often as possible. We

How do parents share their ideas, gifts, and talents with the Head Start program?

PCC – Parent Committee Meetings are held monthly. At these meetings, family and staff discuss center and community concerns and suggestions. Presenters discuss topics of interest chosen by the participants and a craft or activity is scheduled.

Policy Council is the advisory board of the Head Start program. Parents, guardians and community volunteers meet monthly to plan for the future of Head Start. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month at the Northern Tier Community Action Corporation's Conference room.
